## **Leigh Memorial Prayer Chain**

Thank you to those who travelled to be with Mere and her family as we said goodbye to Lopeti on Friday. The importance of church family can never be taken for granted. We will continue to pray for Mere and her family and offer our love and support.

We will soon be collecting for another donation to Meals Plus. We would like to bring food in for Sunday 23<sup>rd</sup> October so we have around a month to start bringing things in. As we continue to move faster towards the last part of the year we start getting ready to share what we have with others. So Meals Plus looks forward to canned and dried goods such as uncooked pasta, rice, cereal. This food helps in feeding around 60 people for breakfast or lunch each day of the week.

We are also able to help out in smaller ways each week. So three easy ways to help others!

- Used stamps- enables the Uniting Church Synod Stamp Committee to fund a range of projects across the year. It is amazing how our used stamps can be used to assist others.
- Tea bag tags- the tags are able to be collected and help in tea companies donating money towards providing wheelchairs for kids with disabilities.
- Small 5c pieces are collected and donated towards assisting other countries. The movement of the 'least coin' uses these to help other people who are disadvantaged.

Final result for the blanket book and soup sale is \$1027. This was a great effort and we would like to have a regular stall on TOC days so if you might be prepared to come and help on these stalls every now and then please speak to one of the elders. It is also important for us to know that each week our offering enables us to reach out to others. There are those who tithe (offer God a tenth of their income), whilst others give what they can. There are those who use the offering envelopes which enable us to have a regular pattern of giving and know when we miss a week and others have a direct debit arrangement. Whatever the way if you would like to think about being more regular in your giving or find a different way of giving then please speak to Rev Christine. The more we give the more we are able to make a difference in the lives of others.

We thank God for the doctors and nurses who have cared for Rev Manas as he recovers from surgery. Naomi is recovering from her surgery and has returned to South Africa for a month. Kevin is recovering and we pray for him. We also recognise there are others receiving different treatment across this next month and for all of these people we pray for God's Healing Spirit to be with them.

#### Luke 16:1-13

1 Then Jesus also said to his disciples, "There was a certain rich person who had a steward, and charges were brought to the rich person against the steward that he was squandering his master's possessions. 2 So the master called the steward in and said to him, 'What is this I hear about you? Give me an account of your management; for you can no longer be my manager.' 3 Now the manager said to himself, "What am I going to do? My master is taking the management away from me. I am not strong enough to dig and I am ashamed to beg. 4 I know what I will do, so that, when I am dismissed from the management, people will receive me into their houses.' 5 And calling his master's debtors one by one he said to the first. 'How much do you owe my master?' 6 And he said, 'One hundred jugs of olive oil.' And he said to him, 'Take your bill, sit down, quickly, write fifty.' 7 Then to another he said, 'And you, how much do you owe?' And he said, 'A hundred bushels of wheat.' And he said, 'Take your bill and write down eighty.'" 8 And the master praised the dishonest manager because he acted shrewdly, because the children of this world are wiser to their own generation than the children of light." 9 And Jesus said, I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of unrighteous mammon so that when it comes to an end they may receive you into the eternal dwelling. 10 The one who is faithful in little things is also faithful with much; and the one who is dishonest in little things is also dishonest in much. 11 lf, then you are not faithful with the unrighteous mammon, who will entrust to you the truth? 12 And if you are not faithful with others goods who will give you goods of your own? 13 No servant can serve two masters for they will either hate one and love the other, or hold fast to one and treat the other with contempt. You cannot serve (Translation by Keith Hamilton) both God and mammon."

## Reflection

It would take considerable space to unpack this parable. Simply put, it is about the disruptive grace of God. Jesus is like a rogue steward who dispenses grace and forgiveness. The master praised the rogue servant, and Jesus says so will God praise his ministry of radical generosity.

The pastoral team had a retreat this week at Kurrajong Heights Uniting Church. Activities included designing a PM liturgical scarf to wear when leading a church service. The design captures our context and understanding of the Christian faith. A model scarf will be made for review, then the final versions.

Last week some of us attended the Corrective Services NSW Chaplaincy Service Annual Dinner, at St Joseph's, Baulkham Hills. The speaker spoke about using art therapy in psychotherapy, and chaplains are considering how to use art in their ministry in correctional centres.

It was interesting to hear the stories of corrective services chaplains, speak of inmates living with a mental illness, illiteracy and who often had experienced childhood trauma. A significant ministry is in listening and giving inmates space to talk. Rev Paul Drury, a Uniting Church chaplain, was recognised for his ministry over many years and his retirement.

Rev David King, also of the UCA, received a 15 year corrective services chaplaincy award. The Minister David Elliot, State Member for Baulkham Hills, and the Commissioner Peter Severin, spoke well of the chaplaincy contribution to both warders and inmates.


Last week I spoke at a forum held by 4 ALP branches on homelessness, and was asked my policy suggestions. Housing a person who is homeless not only assists the person; it saves the community \$44,000 per year in reduced health and justice expenses. Poverty, which is a lack of resources to flourish, is a significant cause, as well as trauma, mental illness, and lack of resilience when things go wrong. Resources include: Financial, emotional, mental/cognitive, language, social capital, physical, spiritual, integrity and trust, motivation and persistence, relationships/role models, knowledge of hidden rules, and hope. What happens in the first 5 years of life teaches trust verses mistrust despair verses hope, resilience, and self-regulation; many in the homeless cohort report experiences of physical and sexual abuse and neglect as children, so programs with expectant mums and new mums at risk, can make a big difference. Also, reducing domestic violence through education, anger management, teaching self-regulation, making it easier for women to leave, and where possible causing perpetrators to leave. Policy suggestions: develop more social housing, affordable housing, funds to employ outreach workers who visit known haunts of people sleeping rough, and working with them to secure housing; programs like the pilot 'Getting Ahead' at Bidwill Uniting, and programs such as NEWPIN and Brighter Futures.

Last week I visited Manas, recovering from double by-pass heart surgery. He is in good spirits, and undergoing the rehabilitation. I passed on the greetings, thoughts and prayers of staff, congregations and people in the community. He asked to be remembered to all. On 21 September, we will hold the annual peace service in the Fellowship Centre, which again has been planned by Manas, who also recruited people of different faiths, to lead prayers.

Last Saturday a number of us delighted in attending Stuart and Suzanne's wedding. Stuart looks after the data projector screens and PA for the Leigh Memorial congregation, as well as assisting our other two congregations. Stuart also co-leads in singing. Stuart and Suzanne had both previously been married, which ended. They individually took up dancing not looking for a partner, but discovered they danced well together and then discovered that another dance had begun. Following their wedding, they and guests danced the night away in the Parramatta Town Hall, which all seemed rather fitting.
